

Ron Hull Ed.D., is Senior Advisor to Nebraska Educational Telecommunications and Professor Emeritus of Broadcasting, UNL. *BACKSTAGE –Stories from My Life in Public Television* is stories about people – stars and unsung heroes – he’s worked with during the past 58 years in Nebraska Public Broadcasting, as head programming at the Corporation for Public Broadcasting in Washington DC, and serving as the television Programming Advisor to the Government of South Vietnam when we brought television to that country to help win “the hearts and minds of the people” in 1966. People, such as Nebraska authors, Mari Sandoz and John G. Neihardt, Actress Sandy Dennis are featured along with personal reminiscences of people who were the “builders” of public television in Nebraska, Washington DC and Saigon, Vietnam.

Andrew Jewell is Associate Professor in the University Libraries, University of Nebraska-Lincoln, and editor of the *Willa Cather Archive* (cather.unl.edu). Andy has published several essays on Willa Cather and other American writers, scholarly editing, and digital humanities. He is co-editor of the books *The American Literature Scholar in the Digital Age* (University of Michigan Press, 2011) and *The Selected Letters of Willa Cather* (Knopf, 2013).



Lisa Knopp is the author of five collections of essays, each of which explores the concepts of place, home, nature, and spirituality. 
